Autumn seems to have come early this year. Many of the plants in my garden are already "over" and some are looking decidedly desiccated. The hosepipe ban has, of course, prevented any rescue mission to re-hydrate so I trust to nature that most, if not all, will recover and re-appear next year. Yorkshire Water has recently been allowed to draw water from the Rivers Wharfe and Ouse. This should protect customers from further restriction, but it is unclear what effect it will have on the wildlife and natural balances of those rivers. Whilst we trust that nature will serve us by returning to balance in the long term, it is a gamble that we have put into the hands of a company motivated by financial gain. Yorkshire Water's responsibility lies directly with financial reward for investors, not our water security or our natural world. Whilst we all trust that nature will protect and preserve us, are we so sure that Yorkshire Water will do the same?



As is our custom, we celebrated the 'end of term' with a delicious buffet lunch, this summer marking 110 years of the WI. Members wore purple, white and green corsages





FROM JADE BOTTERILL, OUR MEMBER of PARLIAMENT

I wanted to share a few highlights from what I've been up to locally.

I had the pleasure of visiting Highburton First School, where it was clear just how much care and effort goes into creating a brilliant learning environment. The staff are doing an incredible job, and the children were an absolute credit to them, polite, clever and confident (and eager to debate cats vs dogs!). A lovely reminder of the strength of our local schools.

I also want to congratulate the organisers of Shelley Gala and the Shelley Garden Festival, especially given the unforgiving weather! Events like this - which bring together young and old members of our community - are vital to our area. From the First School Choir to Scissett Youth Band and the Gala Queen, it was brilliant to have local young people entertaining the community while raising money for good causes.

I was proud to mention the Gala, and the volunteers who run it, in the House of Commons last month. Without the hard work of these dedicated volunteers, these events wouldn't be possible. Thank you to each and every one of you - from clearing up the smash crockery to making contingency plans for the weather - our community would be less vibrant without you.

I met with the fantastic team at Natural Kirklees who support more than 100 voluntary groups across our area. It was so inspiring to hear about the work they're doing to protect and grow local green spaces, so future generations can enjoy them. If you would like to get involved, their website has a section where you can find your local group and get in touch.

I also had the opportunity to sit down with local bus operator, Transdev to discuss the challenges and opportunities around public transport in our area. We talked about local routes and the importance of keeping our villages connected, especially for those who rely on buses to get to work, school, medical appointments, or simply to stay in touch with friends and family. I'll continue working closely with Transdev and local communities to push for services that are dependable and meet the needs of residents across our villages.

This meeting was followed by the announcement of West Yorkshire's Bus Service Improvement Plan, which sets out an ambitious vision for better buses in our area. I was pleased that, following conversations I have had with our West Yorkshire Mayor, as well as the great campaigning of people locally, Kirklees will be one of the first areas to benefit from enhanced bus services.

KIRKLEES COUNCIL REPORT

Hello to all in Shelley

Writing in mid August, we are now firmly in the midst of what the media has for long termed the "silly season". This came about because August is, for many, prime holiday season when government and local authorities operate on minimum staffing levels. Essentially, they just tick-over and we do not usually see major policy initiatives, which leaves the media scrambling around to fill column inches (or broadcast minutes) with whatever stories come to hand. Kirklees council is no exception, and is in semi-hibernation as I write.

Nonetheless I do hear rumours and whispers, from many different sources, and some at least are credible. Most importantly, I have been told by two different, well informed and absolutely unconnected people that it seems that Kirklees Council will escape functional bankruptcy. If true, and I have no reason to doubt this, that will bring great relief to the people of the Borough. The consequences of insolvency have been seen elsewhere to be dire, with government-appointed commissioners swooping in, pressing for staff redundancies and severe cuts in "discretionary" services (which means anything the council does over and above what it is obliged to do by law), and selling-off municipal assets such as sports facilities, community buildings and town halls before departing again.

These external commissioners have no remit to consider local sensibilities, traditions or aspirations, just the single-minded task of balancing the books before returning whence they came. They are most often senior accountants, an honourable profession but not one much noted for sentimentality. The Commissioner process, essential as it may be, is not a pretty one and nor is it painless. It will be in the best interests of us all to forego that experience!

Whilst the talk of avoiding effective bankruptcy is very welcome, I also hear that Kirklees is likely to seek further savings and reduce spending yet again. We are already seeing a marked reluctance to tackle "discretionary" issues such as weed control, and with two different departments (Greenspace and Highways) involved I have received sometimes contradictory advice on what will or will not be done. The path down the Whins to the school has recently seen encroaching weeds dealt with (Greenspace), but my request to have the shrubs down Red Hill (a crossover between Greenspace and Highways) cut back has so far generated nothing more than silence. In my experience, such silence often presages a changing policy, which does not augur well there.

Naturally, Shelley is not alone in experiencing cut-backs and delays in provisions. I have ten villages in my ward, and all have similar issues to confront. Likewise, Kirkburton ward is by no means unique in Kirklees. I have said several times now that there is a need of a DIY approach to many things. Truly, we are now in Lord Kitchener territory: Your Country **Community Needs You!**

There is scope for further cuts in Kirklees discretionary provisions, although it is likely that none would prove painless. Broad areas such as "community support" and ward funds might be vulnerable, as may be some sections of Highways spending. There is little to be gained by speculation, but some further reductions seem inevitable.

Meanwhile, I was talking to a senior Highways engineer about, amongst other things, the junction of Far Bank with Huddersfield Road. He readily agreed that the road markings there are in need of renewal, and seemed confident of being able to get on with that soon (we spoke on 11th August). The engineer was sincere, but I won't be celebrating that until I see the gleaming new markings!

During her teens, Fiona's popular music resounded throughout our house! Among her favourites were David Bowie, Sting, Phil Collins and the Boom Town Rats. A few weeks after her 20th birthday Midge Ure and Bob Geldof got together to plan a pop concert to support people in Ethiopia suffering from a dreadful famine. It turned out to be the one biggest pop concert the world has ever seen! They had very little time to plan, recruit and rehearse acts to appear at their chosen venues, Wembley Stadium and JFK stadium, Philadelphia. At the time, my workplace was in Olympic Way, just 300 yards from Wembley Stadium. It was an opportunity not to be missed! At first I bought 2 tickets for Fiona and a friend and a week later, realising that this was going to be a huge, historic musical event, I bought tickets for myself and some work mates.



The concert started at 12 noon. First on were Status Quo with "Rockin' all over the world." Immediately, the crowd which had been building, with eager anticipation erupted and within seconds we were singing and dancing on the field and the terraces with people we had only just met! That set the tone for the the whole day! Fans had travelled from all over the country and abroad. Throughout the early afternoon we witnessed familiar pop stars perform and we became blaze as there were so many of them. At one point cameras panned on to a familiar couple in the stands and we saw the then Prince Charles and Diana on the large screen by the stage. At 3.18pm Phil Collins took to the stage, not with his band Genisis but he sang with three other pop stars and solo with his own piano accompaniment. He was on stage for 21 minutes before rushing off and taking off in Noel Edmond's private helicoptor to Heathrow. Not long after, Concorde flew low over the stadium with Phil Collins on board bound for New York. His journey was not yet done, he was helicoptered the 150 miles to the JFK stadium in Philadelphia, to join the concert there. When he appeared on stage, he said, "Earlier today I was performing at Wembley Stadium, London, and now I am at the JFK stadium, Philadelphia. Funny old world innit?"

Back at Wembley, it was a very hot afternoon. The fans were wearing tea shirts and thin apparel. For safety reasons, to keep us cool, we were sprayed, liberally, with cold water. This had a remarkable transforming effect!!

In the late afternoon, it was Queen's turn. Freddie Mercury had been advised by his doctor not to attend as he had a cold virus. Freddie ignored the advice and what transpired over the next 21 minutes was lauded as being the best pop gigs of all time! The sound engineer turned up the volume, the fans responded, singing and dancing to their favourite songs, clapping and punching the air in unison to "Radio Gaga". In his typical flamboyant, yes, arrogant style, Freddie Mercury made us believe that all that we had previously witnessed were merely warm up acts!

The concert continued with live coverage from the JFK stadium Philadelphia with the Beach Boys singing "Wouldn't it be nice?" The effect was uncanny! We had all been watching the acts on the big screen and continued to do so, singing and dancing to the music, it was as if the Beach Boys were actually in the stadium at Wembley!

The day never seemed to end! At dusk, the concert in Wembley ended with the grande finale, "Do they know it's Christmas? The fans carried on singing the chorus as they poured down the stadium steps on their way home to carry on watching the concert in Philadelphia on t/v until the early hours.

Recently Live Aid has been severely criticised on a number of issues. This is most unfair! The concert was cobbled together with the minimum amount of time by a handful of people. The performers and organisers gave up their time for nothing. It was a snapshot in a time 40 years ago!

It's worth saying that it was so easy to buy a ticket, just cash at the counter of the Wembley box office, no booking fee, no need to pay by card and no ballot for tickets! Recently, it was announced that a Concorde style supersonic plane is being considered to be put into production which could fly from Heathrow to New York in 4 hours. 40 years ago, Phil Colins did it in Concorde in 3 and a half hours!
